

The Rev. Richard Nolan Named Assistant Dean At Seminary

The Rev. Richard T. Nolan, 31, former Episcopal chaplain at Cheshire Academy, currently instructor at Hartford Seminary Foundation, has been appointed

assistant dean of the Foundation, effective July 1. He has also been named managing editor of The Hartford Quarterly, the seminary's scholarly journal, and lecturer in philosophy and education.

A graduate of Boston Latin School and Tabor Academy, the former Cheshire resident received a B.A. in 1960 from Trinity College. In working toward a B.D. degree at Hartford Seminary in 1963, he studied for a year at Berkeley Divinity School (New Haven), completed a three-month Summer program in clinical pastoral training with the Institute of Pastoral Care at Connecticut Valley Hospital in Middletown and studied at Union Theological Seminary, New York. Between 1963 and 1965 he completed course work toward a Ph.D. degree in religious education at New York University and is currently writing his thesis for the degree. In 1967 he received an M.A. in Religion from Yale University.

Editor of the recently published *The Diaconate Now*, a book in historical theology, Assistant Dean-elect Nolan has held positions and Summer posts at Watkinson School, Choir School of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, Cheshire Academy, University of Miami and Long Island University. For the past two years he has been a part-time lecturer in philosophy at the Universities of Connecticut and Hartford. This Summer Mr. Nolan will be visiting instructor in Oriental Religions at Trinity College.

Elected to Phi Delta Kappa, an honor society for men in education, the Rev. Nolan is also a member of the Religious Education Association, American Philosophical Association, American Academy of Religion and American Association of University Professors.

Since his ordination in 1963,

the Episcopal cleric has served as a Sunday assistant minister and Summer supply in parishes of the Episcopal Dioceses of New York and Connecticut. Now a Bristol resident, he is in his third year on the part-time staff of Trinity Church, Bristol; from September through the following August he will serve as minister-in-charge of the parish, while the rector is on a sabbatical leave, and will be assisted by a full-time minister.

The Hartford Seminary Foundation, having its roots in the 1833 establishment of the Theological Institute of Connecticut, is a fully accredited graduate school of religious studies. Including Roman Catholic and Protestant students and faculty members, the Foundation offers graduate degrees to men and

women preparing for research, teaching and church-related work in biblical studies, church history, history of religions, social sciences and religion, theological-philosophical studies and religious education. Dean Nolan will assist with the administration of the academic programs in the office of the Academic Dean.
